Centaur Media Brexit survey

Objectives:

- What are our audiences' views on Brexit? How did they vote, what do they
 want from our future relationship with the EU, and what are their attitudes
 towards no deal, a second referendum, etc...?
- Are some portfolios more pro/anti-Brexit than others?
- To what extent does the attitude of Centaur's audiences match the general population?
- What impact has Brexit had on our audience's job role and company?



Methodology


- Online survey sent out to our marketing & creative, legal, engineering, HR
 and financial audiences. The non-work related questions in the survey were
 also sent to a nat rep sample for comparison purposes
- Fieldwork period 20th November 1st December 2017 (before talks moved to trade)
- 9,040 responses from Centaur's audience (6,623 completes). 2,086 work in marketing; 2,698 in legal; 1,494 in engineering; 1,687 in financial; 396 in HR and 1,693 in other
- 1,141 responses from the nat rep sample (1,000 completes)



Background



In a 2nd referendum a small movement from remain to leave would see a 2%pts increase in the overall leave vote








Didn't/wouldn't vote or not sure

Attitude to Brexit and what they want from the negotiations




The engineering audience are less focused on 'taking back control' than the general public






The engineering audience want a softer Brexit but feel the EU is being inflexible and they do see no deal as a realistic option





The engineering audience want a 2nd referendum and feel the 48% are being ignored but there is much common ground






Engineering remainers and leavers are more staunch than their counterparts in the general public




Engineering remainers see fewer benefits to Brexit and want closer ties than remainers in the general population






Leavers in the general population want closer ties with the EU post-Brexit than Centaur leavers






The engineering audience is vociferous and split. There is little common ground between leavers and remainers






Remainers in the general population are more accepting of (or resigned to?) Brexit than engineering's remainers






There's little evidence of any leaver regret. Engineering leavers are closer to the 'hard Brexit' position





The only thing engineering remainers and leavers even remotely agree on is that they think Brexit will happen






Engineering portfolio



The engineering audience is conflicted. Half want a second referendum and nearly half just want to get on with Brexit



A sizeable minority of The Engineer's audience was pro-leave





They feel most favourably about Vince Cable's approach to Brexit, but this is followed by David Davis' approach

1 in 2 want a second referendum



50% think the Gov. has a duty to implement Brexit and nearly 50% just want to get on with it



40% think no deal is better than a bad deal



6 in 10 say we should stay in the single market



Free trade with the EU is their top priority in Brexit negotiations



Their 2nd biggest priority was to sign trade deals with non-EU countries

Summary



Summary


- Two thirds of the engineering audience voted remain, but the picture is nuanced. They want a softer Brexit than the general public and are less keen to 'take back control', but there is still a lot of common ground. Our audience feel the EU is being inflexible and would prefer no deal over a bad deal
- Both our remain and leave audiences are more vociferous than their counterparts amongst the general public and there are no areas of agreement between them
- Around 1 in 5 EU nationals who are part of the engineering audience expect to leave the UK due to Brexit
- If the Government largely gets what it wants, this will be seen overall by our audience as a slightly positive outcome




Industry sector
